WHAT CAN MEDICAL JOURNAL EDITORS DO IT IN WAR?

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About Croatian Medical Journal (CMJ)? - 1

- CMJ was established in 1991. by Matko and Ana Marušić, at that time professors at Zagreb University School od Medicine.
- They volunarily functioned as Journal's co-Editors in Chief.
- Matko Marušć resigned in 2009, and Ana Marušić in 2011.



About Croatian Medical Journal (CMJ)? – 2

- CMJ became indexed in Current Contents in 1998, and in Medline 1999.
- Ana Marušić served as:
 - President of the World Association of Medical Editors (WAME)
 - President of the Council of Science Editors (CSE)
 - President of European Association of Science Editors (EASE)
 - Member of the International Committee of Medical Journal Editors (ICMJE)



The war

- With the fall of communism, Yugoslavia was transformed into 6 independent republics.
- Republic of Serbia opposed independence of other republics and attacted Slovenia, Croatia, and Bosnia-Herzegovina in 1991, and in the latter two the aggression lasted until 1995.
- This war for independence, Croats call The Homeland War.



Editors' idea


- Second World War has been budrened with innumerable lies which portrayed Tito's communists (Partisans) as the just liberators, and Croats as guilty for 90-99% of made-up war attrocities.
- Scientific historic analysis performed as late as 1990-ties indicated the opposite.
- The Editors of CMJ thus decided to **research**, analyze and publish warrelated events withing the wide frame of medicine and public health.

Overall result of the war-medicine related research promoted by Croatian Medical Journal editors

- Ana and Matko Marušić, professors at University of Zagreb School od Medicine and co-editors of Croatian Medical Journal
- helped Croatian physicians involved in military medicine to publish
 172 articles in international and 188 articles in Croatian journals
 (majority in Croatian Medical Journal); total around 360, as well as 9 books (all in English).







How we did it -1


• First, we decided to publish war-related articles. This has to be said because some members of the Editorial Bord were against it. Their argument was: "We are a science journal (implying "not political")."

• However, military medicine and especially war-related public health are scientific subjects of utmost importance.

How we did it -2

- We approached physicians and other health professionals in war zone and on battlefronts.
- They were happy for this attention and cooperated wholeheartedly.
- Through this phase of the work, we realized that they
- a) know their profession,
- b) love it, but
- c) do not know the importance of publishing, and,
- d) did not know the publishing process.
